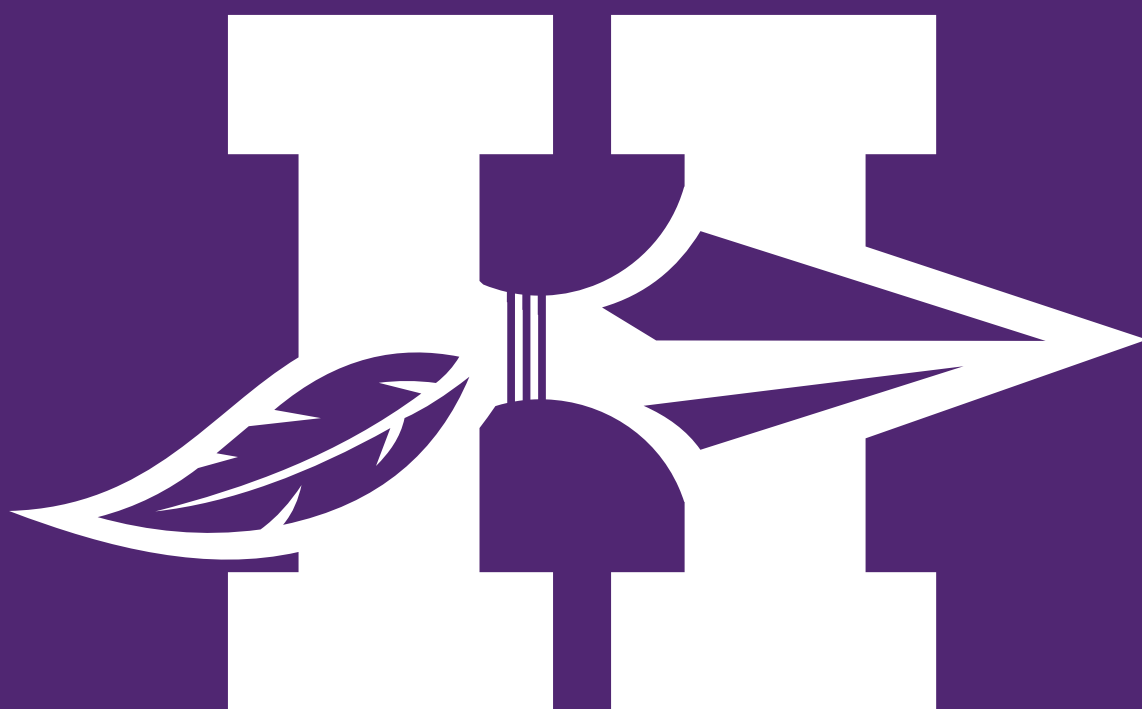

CTE Mission Statement

The mission of Hononegah's Career and Technical Education program is to cultivate potential by integrating rigorous classroom instruction with relevant, technical-based experiences that inspire, guide, and empower students for post-secondary and career opportunities.

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What is Dual Credit ?

Dual Credit Courses

A dual credit course means a college course taken by a high school student for credit at both the college and high school level. Dual credit courses are offered at Hononegah Community High School and at Rock Valley College (RVC). Students in grades 9-12 shall be allowed to enroll in an unlimited amount of dual credit courses and earn an unlimited amount of academic credits from dual credit courses, as provided under the Dual Credit Quality Act for dual credit courses offered at Hononegah Community High School. Students in grades 11 and 12 shall be allowed to enroll in dual credit courses and earn academic credits from dual credit courses, as provided under the school's policy pertaining to part-time student status, at Rock Valley College (RVC). Review the guidelines below regarding students in grades 11 and 12 taking classes at RVC:

- The student must be a Junior or Senior with the exception of the Porter Scholar program through Beloit College which is open to Seniors only.
- Junior students must attend at least five classes at Hononegah Community High School.
- Students can take dual credit classes at the Rock Valley College campus with prior approval using the Alternative Credit Approval Form found on the SSS webpage.
- The student must have college approval to take the class.
- The student assumes responsibility for payment of all fees. Please note, the dual credit classes at RVC are at the regular RVC cost and not the high school cost for classes offered at Hononegah Community High School.
- Grades will be posted to the student's transcript. Senior students with part-time status have the option to not post grades on their transcript if they notify the SSS Office in writing.
